- A **final plan** must be approved by advisor and submitted to the RHSA Director's Office (Young 206) no later than the end of the tenth week of classes of the semester prior to the anticipated semester of graduation.
- Students must pass all required courses, adhere to registration requirements and restrictions of RHSA, and earn:
 - At least 64 credits toward the degree**
 - At least 42 credits of UConn RHSA courses** (No more than 22 credits of 1000 level coursework, including courses listed in Part I, maybe be used toward the AAS degree, unless approved by the Director).*
 - *Note: Transfer students may be eligible for an exception; contact RHSA Director.
 - At least a 2.0 Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)**
- No more than 6 credits of Independent Study, Internships and Special topics may be applied toward the AAS degree, unless approved by the Director. Courses taken on Pass/Fail may NOT be used to meet any requirements.
